A large table in the library, at which the patients can write, if "assist the doctor," they can become possessed of the materials. A newspaper is furnished daily, except Sunday, on each hall, and several patients pay for and receive papers of their own. The library, as well as the billiard-room, is for the amusement of the patients of the three halls.

This is situated on the third story, next to the roof and is in many respects the most desirable location for a patient's room in the entire building. A strip of carpet is stretched along the center of the hall. On this floor is found a comfortable sitting-room, tastefully carpeted and furnished. As in the library, a rocking-chair is to be seen, and generally has an occupant. This is a source of great comfort to the patients. The walls of this room are hung with pictures, and the view from its window is one of great scope as well as beauty. The class of patients occupying this hall was, the reporter understood, different from those in the other halls, but he could not distinguish any very marked characteristics.

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
