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DEATH WAS THE PILOT

Awful Loss of Life Caused by the Burning of a Mississippi River Packet.

The Steamer Kate Adams, Loaded with Passengers, Taken Fire While on Her Journey.

A Fearful Pain Endured and Although the Vessel Is Run Ashore at Last Thirty-five Lives Are Lost.

Memphis, Tenn., Dec. 23.—Thirty-five lives were lost by the burning of the steamer Kate Adams near Commerce, Miss., this morning.

The craft was one of the most elegant of the Mississippi river packets.

She was on route to Memphis and had about 200 people aboard, including her deck and cabin crew of eighty, twenty-five of whom were passengers, and twenty-five colored cabin passengers.

It was about 6 o'clock when the discovery was made that the cotton near the forward end of the boiler was ablaze.

A scene of the wildest confusion ensued. The passengers who were at breakfast when the alarm was given all made a rush for the deck.

At the time the steamer was about 200 yards from the Mississippi side of the river and her bow was at once headed for the shore.

Pilot Joe Barton was on watch and he remained heroically at his post until the vessel was holed by the second clerk, who was seated at the table when the alarm was given, brought all the ladies and children forward and assisted them ashore.

Edgar, who was sitting at the table, the latter-deck giving his commands until the stagg plank was safely lowered.

The fire by this time had spread all about the deck, and the passengers were forced to retreat to the rear, where he climbed over the rails and descended to the cabin.

Here he found Chief Clerk W. C. Blanker, who had made an effort to save the money and baggage in the steamer, which were in the safe, but was cut off from the bow and forced back into the cabin.

At this time the burning steamer had swung into the river and an effort was made to launch the yawl. Its occupants were nearly all colored men, but there were three or four women in the crowd.
